RAWCS VOLUNTEER PROGRAM POSTPONED FOR SEPTEMBER

It is with much regret that we have to postpone the upcoming Volunteer Tour to Kenya in September.

Due to ongoing threats of terrorism in areas of Kenya, we are suspending any further Volunteer trips to our project **until 2015**.

While we have never felt unsafe in Kenya and authorities have increased security measures in Mombasa and Nairobi, we feel it is necessary to follow the travel advice of the Australian Government.



In our experience, Kenyans are peaceful and friendly people; so it deeply saddens us that travel warnings may create a sense of fear, which will have long-term effects on the tourism industry.

Many businesses, especially in the Diani Beach region where we stay during volunteer tours, rely on tourists to survive.

The safety of our volunteers remains our number one priority, so we will continue to keep you updated on the changing situation in Kenya.

We have had many expressions of interest for our Volunteer Program and we look forward to being able to continue taking Australians to the project in the near future.

It's time to get together your team of 4 for our **Charity Golf Day**, which will be held on Sunday October 19th at Bargara Golf Club.


We are still seeking a few hole sponsors for \$100 each if your business would like to donate.

CATHY'S CORNER

I would like to tell you about the Flemings, a very generous Bundaberg family who have been supporting the Umoja Team from the beginning of the project.

I first met Cliff and Lee Fleming when I was 17. I had recently moved from Charleville in Western Queensland to Bundaberg and I was looking for work. Cliff and Lee, along with Cliff's mother and father, owned Electra Breweries—a bottling and fermenting business now known as **Bundaberg Brewed Drinks**. I was lucky enough to gain employment in their office for several years.

What struck me from the outset was how hard the family worked and how much they valued their employees. The Flemings fostered such a wonderful workplace environment, which encouraged the staff to work equally as hard to meet the daily challenges. This family still runs the brewery and continues to value teamwork and quality.

I eventually moved on and had my own family. We lived overseas for many years in Papua New Guinea, and it gave me enormous pleasure to see their company grow over the years both locally and internationally. Their products were now being sold abroad and the brewery was being recognised as a leader in non-alcoholic beverages. All the Flemings' hard work had finally paid off.

I am so grateful for my long-term association and friendship with Cliff and Lee. Since I started the Umoja Project I have often asked Cliff for his advice, and I still value his wisdom like I did back when I was 17. I would like to publically acknowledge the financial support the Fleming family has given the project over the last three years. Their assistance has allowed us to grow and continue on the path to our dream of opening a children's village in Kenya. Who would have thought that day I sat in front of Cliff for a job interview that his family would be supporting *my* dream nearly 40 years later?

I am immensely proud of the work that we do for orphans and vulnerable communities, and I know that my strong work ethic and ability to push past the daily setbacks can be traced back to my early days working with Electra Breweries. I witnessed their hard journey towards achieving their dreams and I get to achieve mine with their help. I am a firm believer that people come into our lives for a reason. Thank you for the opportunity you gave me all those years ago and the values you have taught me.

Together we will achieve the extraordinary.
